



PLANS FOR TWO NEW GENEALOGICAL PROJECTS ANNOUNCED BY NHG BOARD

North Hills, PA - The North Hills Genealogists' board of directors announces plans for two new projects of interest to local genealogists. One long-term project is the fourth cemetery project for our organization. The second project is a first for the NHG, hosting a one-day genealogical workshop in the fall with programs for beginners as well as experienced genealogists.

All members of the NHG are encouraged to participate in these upcoming projects. The success of each project relies upon the help of volunteers from the NHG.

The cemetery project, proposed by Elissa Scalise Powell, CG, and Amy Prager, will preserve information in the cemeteries of Indiana Township and Fox Chapel, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania. The scope of this project, including the number of graves and cemeteries to be read, is comparable to cemetery projects completed and published by NHG in the past. Powell and Prager will serve as Co-Chairs of the Cemetery Committee for this project. Look for more detailed information in future issues of the newsletter.

A genealogical workshop in the North Hills area is scheduled for Saturday October 25, 2008. Amy Arner is the conference chair for this first-time NHG event. The purpose of this workshop is to provide educational opportunities in the field of genealogy for interested individuals in our area.

The plans include a series of workshops on a variety of topics, and small-group breakout sessions. The location will be Christ Episcopal Church on Babcock Boulevard. Breakfast and lunch will be included in the registration fee for the NHG fall genealogical workshop.

This genealogical workshop will provide another local opportunity to further your interest in genealogical research in 2008. Save the date of Saturday, October 25, 2008, on your calendar and watch for updated and detailed information in future newsletters and on our website.

Happy Saint David's Day!

You may ask, "What? Surely, as the Celtic festive season is imminent, he must mean Happy St. Patrick's Day." After all, who doesn't know St. Patrick!

There is another Celtic national patron saint. His name is St. David, the patron of the country of Wales. He died on March 1st, 589, and his life is commemorated on that date each year. So who is St. David, and why is he so important to the Welsh?

St. David, or Dewi Sant as he is known in the Welsh language, was born in the late fifth century in western Britain in an area that is now called Pembrokeshire, Wales. He is said to be of royalty as the son of Sandde, prince of the region, and Non, the daughter of a local chieftain.

Dewi was a preacher, monk, abbot, and archbishop of Wales. He worked to spread the Christian faith among the pagan tribes of western Britain and started a Celtic monastic community at the present-day location of St. David's Cathedral. The Cathedral and St. David have both become symbols of the aspirations for Welsh independence.

On March 1st, Welshman worldwide will be celebrating St. David's Day, a tradition that began in the twelfth century when Dewi was canonized by Pope Callactus the Second. Join in and become a Welshman for the day!

So to you I say: Dydd Gwyl Dewi Hapus - Happy Saint David's Day!

NATIONAL ARCHIVES ANNOUNCES EXTENDED RESEARCH ROOM HOURS

Washington, DC.- Archivist of the United States Allen Weinstein announced today that the National Archives will restore its evening and weekend hours in its Washington, DC and College Park, MD, research rooms. Effective the week of April 14, 2008, the extended hours will be 9 A.M. to 9 P.M. Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday and 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. Saturday. Hours on Monday and Tuesday will continue to be 9 A.M. to 5 P.M.

Congress and the President provided a one-time appropriation of \$1.3 million in the National Archives Fiscal Year 2008 budget to restore these hours. The funds will be used to hire new archival research room staff and to cover the costs of utilities, maintenance, and security during the extended hours.

"I am very grateful to the Congress and the President for their recognition of the importance of making our documentary heritage as widely available as possible. Extending the research room hours goes a long way in helping us attain this goal.

This increase in hours underlines our commitment to open government," the Archivist said in making the announcement. "I would also like to acknowledge the enthusiastic support of our user communities," he added.

Research room hours at the National Archives Building in Washington, DC and at the College Park facility were reduced in October 2006 as a cost-savings measure. Since then, the National Archives has had extended hours only once a month on Thursday and Friday evenings and on Saturdays. Prior to October 2006, the National

Archives extended hours were Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. The change from Tuesday to Wednesday evening late hours was implemented to make it more convenient and cost-effective for out-of-town researchers who travel to the National Archives for research.

GENEALOGICAL BLOGS OFFER ADVICE AND RESOURCES

Blogs are becoming the newest avenue for communicating about genealogical research. What's a BLOG? The word blog is a blend of "web log." In the past four years, blogs have become a popular method for individuals or groups of people to provide news, ideas, commentary, and journal entries to others through the worldwide web. In fact, you can access and read blogs on your computer with a web browser and internet connection.

Blogs showcase topical discussions that have been self-published by people with an interest in a specific subject or field. A unique aspect of blogging is that others can respond to a blog posting or entry and engage in a discussion with the writer, all from the comfort of home.

If you plan to start your own blog, you must first create your blog web page through a blog service. Most are free to host your blog. Through any web browser, you can explore various blog sites. One that I recommend for its ease of use, its concise explanations, and its free services is <https://www.blogger.com/start>. If you decide to begin your own blog, be sure that you carefully read the Terms of Service and the Content Policy links. Once you begin to write posts or updates, other people can respond to you and your ideas. You can add text, images, and keep a list of favorite links to other sites. There is no limit to what can be changed.

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GENEALOGICAL BLOGS OFFER ADVICE AND RESOURCES

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Blogging is the fastest growing means of sharing ideas on the internet. Genealogists have successfully entered the realm of blogging. FOCUSING ON PASSENGER LISTS AND IMMIGRANT ANCESTORS

This month's presentation is by an active genealogist and NHG member, Elissa Scalise Powell, CG. Her presentation is titled, "Sailing into the Sunset: Tips for Finding Your Ancestors on Passenger Lists." During Elissa's program, she will review the history of why passenger lists were recorded in order to understand the types of records that exist. In addition, she will discuss various indexes, research aids, internet sources, and examples of records and where to find these records.

As Elissa explains in her program synopsis, "Most people have at least one immigrant ancestor who arrived by ship, but the records that have been kept over the years are mostly chronological. Passenger lists are a wonderful resource for finding out more about the origins of immigrant ancestors." The following information is offered in addition to Elissa's presentation. Included here are general suggestions for genealogists of all levels, who are researching the arrival of their immigrant ancestors, the naturalization of those ancestors, and/or passenger lists.

A popular starting point is to explore the Ellis Island web site: <http://www.ellisland.org/>. On the left side is a link for "Genealogy" and under that link are three helpful sub-topics: "Getting Started," "Free Charts and Forms," and "Helpful Sites." Keep in mind that you will only find images or information if your ancestor arrived through this port. The site is very useful for its free forms and the list of related links, even if you do not find your relative.

Some immigrants arrived through Canadian ports in the 19th century. Canada's Immigration Museum maintains a timeline of Canadian immigration at its web site found at:

<http://www.pier21.ca/>. The database on this site is not as simple to use, but the historical information about ships, arrivals, and passenger lists is detailed and simple to browse.

Another resource for finding passenger lists, ship manifests, and general immigration information is available through the web site of the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana at <http://www.acpl.lib.in.us/>. Once you access this site, click first on "Genealogy" found on the left menu, and then scroll down to "Passenger Lists" which cites all holdings related to this topic.

Beginners and experienced genealogists alike can benefit from the data about immigrants and passenger lists outlined and linked by the USGenWeb Project on their web site, found at: <http://www.usgenweb.org/research/immigration.shtml/>. The main article, "Immigration and Passenger Arrival Records," explains where genealogists can find the answers to their questions about their immigrant ancestors and provides a bulleted list of links regarding this topic.

These suggestions are just a few tidbits listed in one place for genealogists who are focusing their family research on immigrant ancestors.
